## COOL, CALM, AND COLLECTED

The gardens are visible from every room. executive Alison Brod and her husband, Andy, a high-yield bond trader, began searching for a permanent Hamptons home three summers ago, the couple assumed the process would be relatively easy. After all, the pair had spent the

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previous 11 summers living in rentals on the eastern end of Long Island and from those experiences, knew exactly what they wanted—a classic cottage by the sea. Unfortunately, what they found out was that finding just the right place was

anything but simple.


Instead of a shingled cottage covered in ivy, they decided upon a vintage 80s beach bungalow with lots of glass and wide-open spaces. The home's unusual modern shape, says Alison, was perfect for entertaining, but lacked the warmth and comfort of a real home. What the property had to offer, she says, was location; it was just a few steps from Mecox Beach in Bridgehampton. "The location, and the gardens, which can be seen from every room of the house were the deciding factor," she says.

The process of hiring a decorator was equally challenging. "Everyone we met wanted to push cabbage roses and chintz, but I knew that just wasn't my style," says Andy. Instead of comfortable country, the couple wanted cool contemporary. "I don't like cluttered spaces," Alison says. "I like warm woods and modern materials." Enter Laura Dupouy, a decorator friend of Alison's aunt. "We hit it off instantly," says Alison. "She pulled samples of things she liked and it fit perfectly with what Andy and I were looking to do."

Dupouy's plan: To create an inviting interior that referenced Alison's love of French Art Deco antiques and Andy's preference for casual contemporary. In the process, she reworked the home's open layout to accommodate a full-size dining room, professional-style kitchen, and an enlarged master bedroom suite. "We thought we were going to start off slowly and change things little by little, but before we knew it the house was gutted and we were in the middle of a full-blown renovation," says Alison.

Downstairs, Dupouy moved the kitchen, a narrow galley at the back of the house, to a more accessible position behind a wall of glass and a custom steel staircase that leads to the couple's master bedroom. The space Dupouy gained became a







dining room. "Before we just had a table in the middle of the living room," says Alison. The new kitchen, outfitted in warm wood European-style cabinets and professional appliances is now the focal point of the first floor. Down the hall, a dingy den was made over with a fresh coat of cool blue paint and soft seating upholstered in brown velvet.

Upstairs, Dupouy reworked the master bedroom, removing a large skylight and enlarging the bath to accommodate an oversized walk-in steam shower and a full-size tub. The tub, which Dupouy crafted from tile and a large pane of glass, is the focal point of the finished room. "The house is architectural, but not icy," says Alison.

To furnish the interior, Dupouy chose a mix of modern pieces from designer Christian Liaigre and French Deco antiques from the Incurable Collector, the Palm Beach antiques shop owned by Alison's parents. "I tried to pick things that stood out on their own," explains Alison. "One of my favorite pieces is an armoire that Dupouy crafted from a pair of antique gates we found at a Paris flea market." Artwork and accessories were purposely kept to a minimum to allow garden views to take center stage. "The windows capture vibrant garden views," says Alison. "They're the art."
